Bob van Ligten

Is energy a problem? And if so, why? It's cheap, isn't it? Not as cheap as you'd think, as we quickly discovered from Bob van Ligten's very well prepared and beautifully illustrated talk on renewable energy and energy efficiency in March this year. Dutch by birth and a member of ASC Locarno, he is now re-

tired after a lifetime in the semiconductor and auto industries. Bob's basic premise was simple. The abundance of energy at an extremely low cost causes us to waste enormous amounts

of energy, as least 50% of what we use. This is mainly due to widespread use of heat engines (gasoline, diesel or steam) which generate large amounts of heat which are just thrown away, and poor insulation, poor ventilation and poor air conditioning of buildings. But he did tell us what we could do personally to help alleviate what could become a critical situation, in both financial and pollution terms. This talk was a real revelation – and with the rapidly increasing cost of crude oil since Bob gave his presentation, we'd be stupid not to take notice. And act.



Recipe corner

Bean soup with tomatoes and bacon

A yummy winter broth of mixed dried pulses (flagelots, soissons beans, split peas, lentils etc.) with tomatoes, bacon and herbs. Serves 4-6

250 g mixed dried pulses
100 g bacon, diced small
2 onions, finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, mashed
a piece of celery root, peeled/chopped
2 carrots
400 g tinned tomatoes and their juice
plenty of rosemary, oregano
a bay leaf
1.5 litres unsalted stock or water
250 g firm potatoes, peeled and cubed
200g frozen spinach, thawed and chopped

salt and pepper
Parmesan cheese, grated

Put the pulses in a pan with cold water to cover amply. Bring to the boil, simmer for 2 minutes, remove from the heat and allow to stand for 2 hours. Cook the bacon cubes in a heavy pan until their fat is rendered and they are lightly golden. Add the onions, garlic,



celery and carrots. Cover and cook gently for about 10 minutes or until slightly soft. Raise the heat, add the tomatoes and their juice and the herbs. Cook hard, mashing the tomatoes into the vegetables, until the juices are somewhat evaporated. Add the stock or water and the potatoes, bring to a boil. Drain the pulses and add them to the soup. Do not season yet, or the beans will harden. Simmer for between 3/4 hour and an hour – taste to see if the pulses are cooked; if not, give them a bit longer. Add the roughly chopped spinach at the end and simmer for 10 minutes more. Season to taste and serve with grated Parmesan.

All this was illustrated with many diagrams, slides and beautiful, atmospheric photos. He ended his lecture with a hair-raising story that happened to him at this year's Ballooning Festival at Chateau d'Oex, when they had to land the balloon high on a mountain due to failing light and zero wind conditions, and had to be rescued by helicopter. Tamaro to Lema

Discovering the Ticino has been part of Big Ben Lugano's summer schedule since it was proposed by Juliusz Komarnicki several years ago. In July, we decided to do the Monte Tamaro to Monte Lema hike again, beginning from Tamaro. It gave us the chance to visit Botta's beautiful church half way up.

We were just six intrepid hikers, three experienced and three less experienced. We set off in the midst of the heat wave and were very

glad of the breezes at the top. The first part was already tough as you need to reach the top of Tamaro before setting off across the mountain tops. A visit to Berne

In April a group of 15 members of ESC Zofingen/Langenthal visited the Tram Depot at the Bärengraben, now a tourist centre and a restaurant. There we saw a most informative and interesting 20-minute video show called "Experience Berne – as it lives, pulsates and moves with the times". The city of Berne was founded by the Duke Berchtold of Zähringen in 1191, becoming a member of the Swiss Confederation in 1353 and its capital in 1848. We had lunch in the Tram Depot, where we had a wonderful view of the Aare, its bridges and the silhouette of the old town. We continued by bus to the Paul Klee centre, dedicated to the life and work of this famous artist. You can see the impressive architecture in the shape of three waves from quite a distance. He was born of a German father and Swiss mother in Münchenbuchsee in 1879. In 1880 his family moved to Berne and he attended grammar school until 1898. Before he died in 1940, he applied for Swiss citizenship, but the Swiss authorities failed to reach a decision. Now we understand why Berne was chosen as the site for Paul Klee's works. MLS

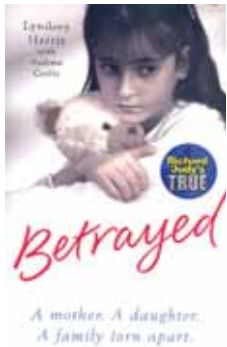

Betrayed

A mother. A daughter. A family torn apart. This is the heartbreaking true story of an unimaginable betrayal. For the first six years of her life, Sarah Harris was a normal, happy, popular little girl. But

from then her life was a living hell, as she became the victim of a vicious eighteen-month hate campaign. Before long she was suspended from school, alienated from her friends and utterly terrified. For her mother, Lyndsey, it was beyond her worst nightmares. Her little girl seemed to have transformed overnight, doing things unthinkable in a six-year-old child. Stealing razor blades, attempting to poison her friends, and accusing her parents of sexual abuse. Soon Lyndsey's marriage was on the verge of collapse, and suddenly Lyndsey was fighting to keep her family together – and to save her daughter's sanity. The only person who stood by Lyndsey was Tanya, her best friend of fourteen years – the one she would trust with her life. But then Lyndsey received a phone call from Tanya's husband and the horrific truth was revealed: Sarah was innocent, and Lyndsey was a victim of the most hurtful betrayal of all...

«Two Lives» tells the remarkable story of Seth's great uncle and aunt. His great uncle Shanti left India in the 1930s to study in Berlin. There he stayed with a Jewish family and met his future

wife Henny, a daughter of the family. It wasn't love at first sight as Henny was in love with someone else. In 1936 Shanti left for Britain, because he couldn't practise as a dentist in Germany. But when the war broke out, he enlisted, served and lost his right arm in combat. Henny arrived in Britain shortly before the war leaving her family behind in Germany. In England she met Shanti, the only person she knew there at the time.

The «third» life in this story is Vikram Seth's own. He came from Calcutta to London in 1969 to continue his education. Staying with Shanti and Henny he began to know and to love them deeply.

This book is about a violent century. It's a portrait of India, the Third Reich, Auschwitz and the Holocaust, Israel and Palestine, post-war Germany and 1970s Britain. But it's also a story of friendship, marriage and love.

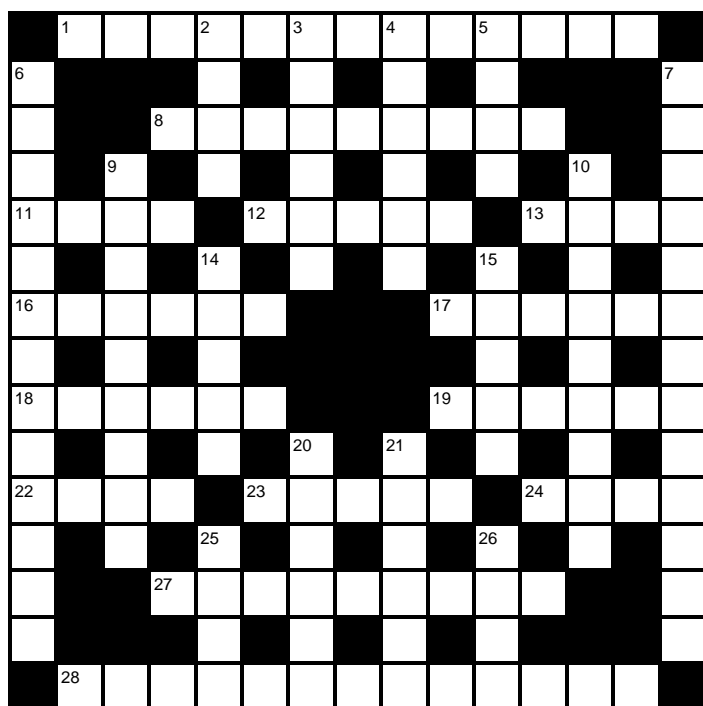
