FASC Speakers

Our spring tour was given by **Kenneth Stevens**, who offered two topics, on poetry and his Scottish highland heritage, and the other on the Sami, the reindeer people in Finland. The second is a subject that Kenneth has studied in depth and spoken about frequently; we learned that the Sami (formerly known as Lapps) live a nomadic life that completely ignores national borders, which can lead to problems when they want to move freely between Northern Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia. Kenneth showed us maps of their territory and brought along several artefacts, and also played a CD with a long ritual Sami song to give us an idea of their unusual culture.

Future speakers

By the time you read this our autumn tour in the last week of October/first week in November will be in full swing. **Aubrey Diem** is a professor of geography and a passionate traveller, historian, geographer, photojournalist and prolific writer; he's now retired and living in Zinal, Valais. He offers a choice of

three topics: "Global Warming: the facts not the hype"; "First Rains of Autumn: a novel of love and war in the Alps"; and "The Middle East Enigma: a political geography of the region". We can look forward to an engrossing evening with this well-informed speaker.

Spring 2009 brings us a visit by **Paul Da Silva**. During the late sixties he was a musician and songwriter, forming several bands in the London area. He has travelled all over the world doing a variety of jobs including teaching English, leadership, and film/video work. More recently Paul embarked on a writing career and is sponsored by Swiss Tourism. "Love on the Verge" is the first of a trilogy of books featuring several Swiss cities; his most recent book is "The Verbier Principle".

Looking ahead to autumn 2009, we expect a visit by **Michael Hall**, an Englishman living in Strasbourg who was a UK delegate to the Council of Europe in 1998-2002. He has written a book, "Eating for Britain", which he spoke about to the Big Ben Club and was reported to be highly amusing. He also has another topic, "UK Attitudes of the European Union".



Local speakers are FASC members who can be contacted any time. The most recent addition to this list – which has just been revised and includes about 20 speakers all over Switzerland – is former FASC president Laurent Belet talking about the Credit Crunch. And there are more new speakers in the pipeline. Recipe corner

Äpler Magrone

"Cowherd's macaroni cheese": a robust and delicious supper dish of elbow macaroni, potatoes, bacon bits and cream, great for when the weather gets cold. In Switzerland it would traditionally be served with apple sauce; a salad makes a nice alternative accompaniment.

Serves 4:

300g elbow macaroni
300g firm, waxy potatoes, peeled and cubed
150g streaky bacon, diced small
200ml whipping cream
black pepper
freshly grated nutmeg

100g Sbrinz or Parmesan cheese, grated
1 onion, sliced
25g butter

Cook the macaroni and potatoes in boiling salted water until just tender –



about 10 minutes. Drain and set aside. Fry the bacon lightly until golden. Pour in the cream and season with pepper and nutmeg. Stir in the pasta and potatoes.

Lightly butter an ovenproof gratin dish and layer the mixture with the grated cheese, finishing with grated cheese. Heat the oven to 180C. Bake the gratin until golden brown and bubbly – 10-15 minutes.

Meanwhile, fry the onion in the butter until golden; scatter on top of the macaroni.

A very brief history

A 100th anniversary scrapbook was put together to mark the occasion, which "contains an almost complete

club history, messages from times long gone and brand-new information with many illustrations". It was written and assembled by Sylvie Arn with contributions by Sylvia Jakob; both are committee members.

No records of the founding of the club survive, or indeed the first 40 years of its life. But it is known to be among the oldest in Switzerland, and it was also one of the founding members of FASC round about the time it celebrated its 25th anniversary. A brief look at past copies of the Anglo-Swiss Times – as the ASN was then called – shows a huge variety of activities. In the 1950s, for example, there

was an annual Anglo-Swiss rally, in which EC Biel always managed to come out on or near the top. In the early 70s the club had its own theatre group with hugely successful performances of "Red Spy at Night" and "April Dawn", which they also took to Basel, Solothurn and Zürich.

Run for many years by Werner Koch and Ken Woodcock, now no longer with us, the club is still very active under the leadership of Werner's wife Nina. All FASC clubs are unique, but EC Biel has perhaps a better claim to this title than most others; after all, what other club has its own clubroom and its own resident chef? *AG*

Trains & gardens

On a trip to the French national railway Museum in Mulhouse in April, Bryan Stone provided the fascinated members of the British Circle in Basel gathered there with a wealth of information about French steam locomotives and France's amazing steam locomotive designer Chapelon. Our inter-active guide gave us a lively tour into cab engines, down through the maintenance pits under the engines and peering into railway carriages from bygone days.

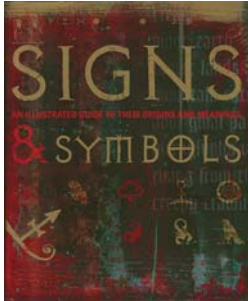

Signs & Symbols

An Illustrated Guide to their Origins and Meanings, ISBN 1-405-32539-9



All the world around us is filled with signs and symbols. Modern signs such as alphabets or flags are universally recognisable, but many ancient symbols

are much harder to decipher. A wonderful new book reveals the origins and meanings of over 2000 of these mythical "letters". Following hundreds of pictures, descriptions and explanations, we are led through the cosmic and natural world, myths and religions of many different cultures to arrive at our modern society and symbol systems.

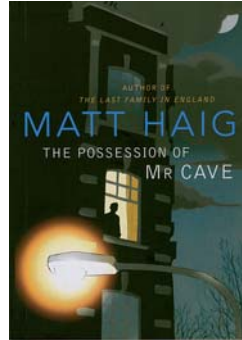
The difference between sign and symbol is not always clear. You can say that a sign gives a simple message that is of immediate relevance. A symbol is a visual image representing an idea. Haunted by the deaths of his mother, wife and son, Terence Cave, the narrator of this book, turns into an over-protective father to his daughter, Bryony. By controlling, stalk-

ing and isolating her, he causes damage beyond repair. She was always his favourite child even when her twin brother Reuben was still alive. Now Terence has Reuben constantly at the back of his mind: he feels guilty. His bad conscience is a steady companion leading him to treat his daughter even more harshly in his duty to protect her.

Mr. Cave doesn't realise till it's too late that "you can create a new life but never own it, and that you should never let the desire to protect become the will to possess".

I adored this sad book. Even though it's a tragic tale, it has a humorous streak that makes you smile all through. If you like this book you should read the other two by Matt Haig. "The Last Family in England", a UK bestseller, is narrated by a Labrador, and "The Dead Fathers Club" is an update of Hamlet featuring an eleven-year-old boy.

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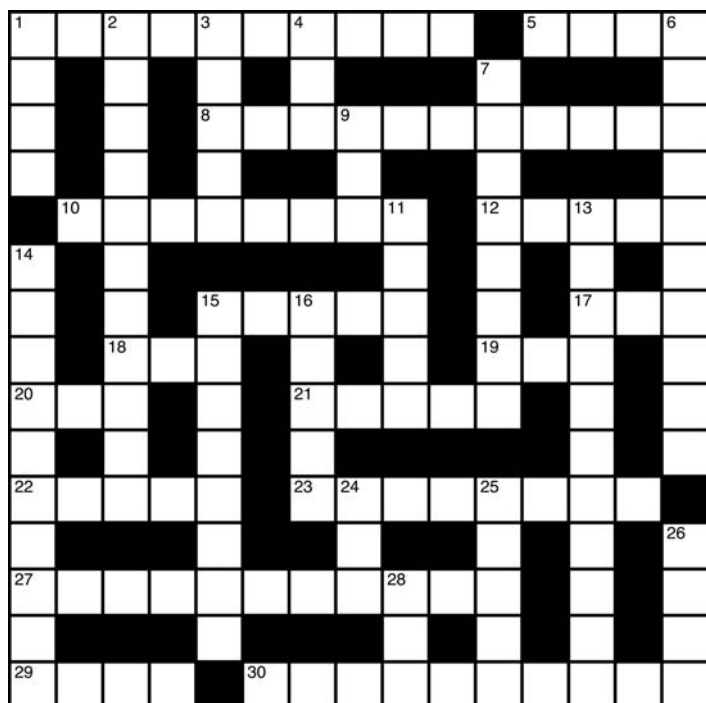
